and awards throughout his career—including the St. Louis American Foundation’s 2015 Excellence in Health Care award—and is actively engaged in community service endeavors with DOORWAYS as well as 100 Black Men of Metropolitan St. Louis, and St. Louis Effort for AIDS.



Reverend Tracey Wolff, M.Div., is the lead pastor at North Hills United Methodist Church (UMC) and the associate pastor at St. Andrew UMC. Prior to this, she served as the Food & Fitness director at Mercy Ministries and then the Connections Pastor at Grace United Methodist Church. Her career has also included nearly 17 years leading women’s basketball—first as a coach at Marquette University (Milwaukee, Wisconsin) and then director of women’s basketball at Athletes in Action (Xenia, Ohio). Rev. Wolff also commits time for service outside her churches, volunteering as a board member not only with DOORWAYS but, also, with Assisi House, St. Louis Homeless Winter Outreach’s housing first initiative, and is a member of the Justice Ministries Vision Team for the UMC Gateway Central District.
